Over 2000 years ago	First circus established in Rome, the Circus Maximus
c.14 and c.15 centuries	Travelling entertainers wandered from town to town
1768	Philip Astley establishes his circus
1825	Joshuah Purdey Brown uses a canvas tent Circuses were also popular in the United states by this time
1927	The State University of Circus and Variety Acts was established in Moscow
1950's	Moscow State Circus starts touring
1960's	Awareness of animal rights develops which has consequences for the circus
Present day	Circuses have moved away from animal performances

Circus

Circus	1.a travelling company of acrobats, clowns, and other entertainers which gives performances, typically in a large tent, in a series of different places. 2.(in ancient Rome) a rounded or oval arena lined with tiers of seats, used for equestrian and other sports and games eg: "the Circus Maximus"
Pull down	When the circus big top is taken down and packed away ready for the next place
Aerialist	Someone who performs above the ground using skills , attached to the ceiling of the Big Top
High wire	A tightly stretched wire above the floor which artists will walk across
Joey	A nickname for a clown after one of the most famous clowns, Joseph Grimaldi
Rola bola	A balancing act where a performer will stand on a cylinder
Trapeze	A swing attached to the ceiling which acrobats use to perform stunts
