To be able to put information into chronological order on a timeline.


To understand the chronology of various significant British kings and queens and be able to place some in the correct order.

Vocabulary	
Chronological	Events put into time order
Banquet	A large public meal or feast with lots of different types of food including desert. It is normally part of a ceremony or celebration.
Coronation	A ceremony in which a King or Queen is crowned.
Medieval	Another word for 'Middle Ages'. It describes a 500 years' time period in history between ancient and modern times. This time dates from 500 AD to 1500 AD.
Monarchy	A monarchy is a form of government that has a single person known as a monarch at its head. This could be run by a King, Queen, Emperor or Empress.
Menu	A list of dishes served at a meal.
Timeline	A way of visually putting events into chronological order.
